




## 3. My business is on the ropes due to the pandemic.

## Origin

The idiom on the ropes comes from the world of boxing. A boxing ring is enclosed by large, heavy ropes. When a boxer has backed into the ropes, that opponent has no means to fight.




- 4. His plan to win the competition bit the dust when he met a very strong opponent.

## Origin

This expression was popularized in movies about the old west or 'Westerns,' where cowboys or Indians were shot or thrown from their horses to land on the dusty ground, thus "biting" the dust.
