


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

a lot of and plenty of

We use *a lot of / lots of / plenty of* with both <u>uncountable</u> and <u>plural nouns</u>.



We have many sausages.

- = We have a lot of sausages.
- = We have lots of sausages.
- = We have plenty of sausages.

a lot of people plenty of ideas

lots of friends

vogu vog vogu vog vogurt vogu vog vogu vog vogurt

We have much yogurt.

- = We have a lot of yogurt.
- = We have lots of yogurt.
- = We have plenty of yogurt.



We use *SOME* in positive sentences.

We use *any* in negative sentences.



some vs. any

We use *some* only in two types of questions:



Questions you ask to offer help



Do you want some sausages?

2 Questions to ask for things



Can I have some yogurt?

May I take some photos here?


We use *any* in all questions except the two types of questions on the left.


