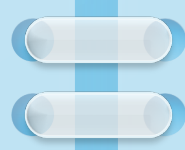

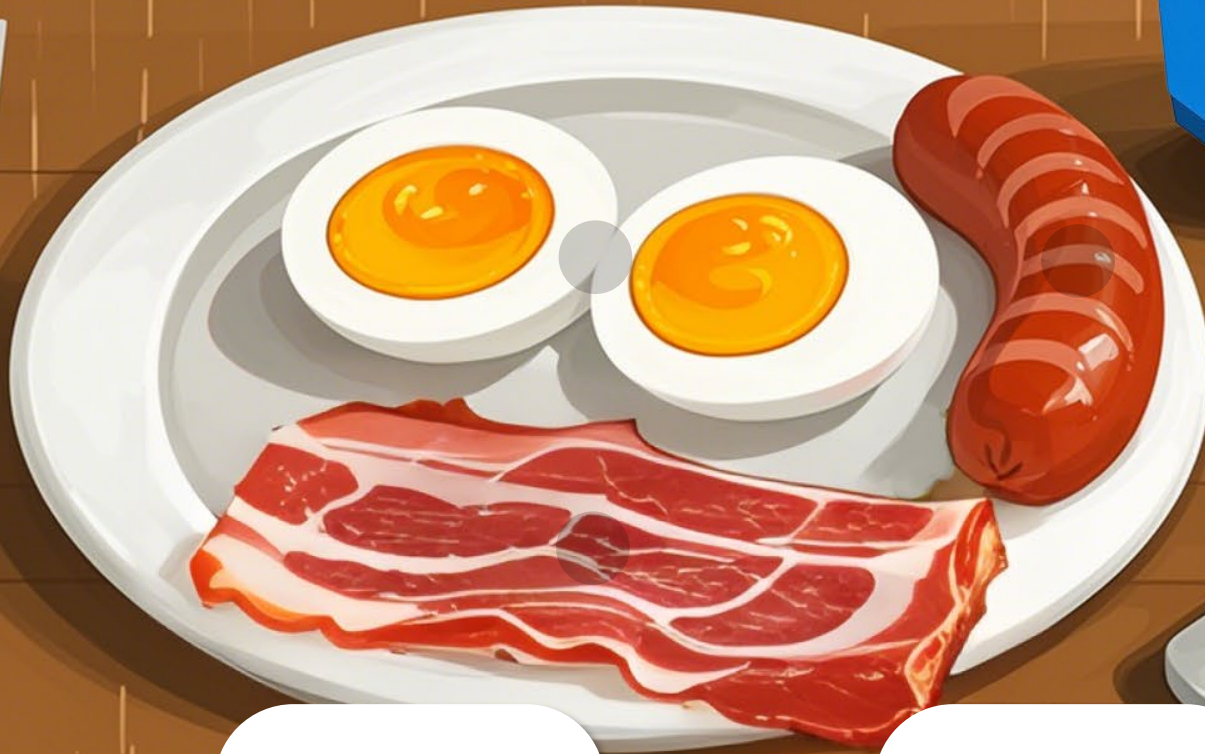

a few vs. a little

a few

We use a few to talk about a small number of things.

a few



countable nouns

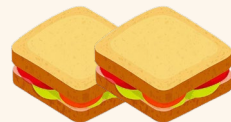


a few boiled eggs
(not many)

a few sandwiches

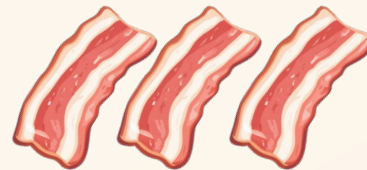
a little

We use a little to talk about a small amount of something.

a little



uncountable nouns



a little bacon
(not much)

a little yogurt



a little orange juice

many vs. much

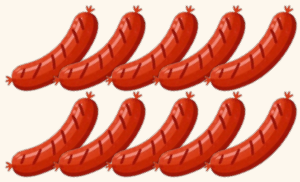
many

We use many to talk about a big number of things.

many



countable nouns



many sausages

More examples



many carrots



many hamburgers

much

We use much to talk about a big amount of something.

much



uncountable nouns



much yogurt

More examples



much ice cream



much soup

Present the Grammar

a lot of and plenty of

We use *a lot of / lots of / plenty of* with both uncountable and plural nouns.



We have **many** sausages.

= We have **a lot of** sausages.

= We have **lots of** sausages.

= We have **plenty of** sausages.

More examples

a lot of people plenty of ideas

lots of friends



We have **much** yogurt.

= We have **a lot of** yogurt.

= We have **lots of** yogurt.

= We have **plenty of** yogurt.

More examples

a lot of water plenty of sugar

lots of money

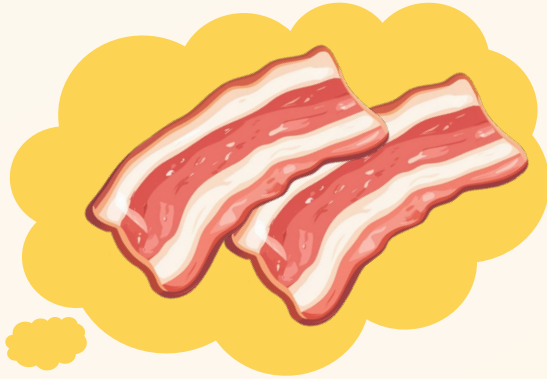
Present the Grammar

some vs. any

We use **some** in positive sentences.

We use **any** in negative sentences.

positive

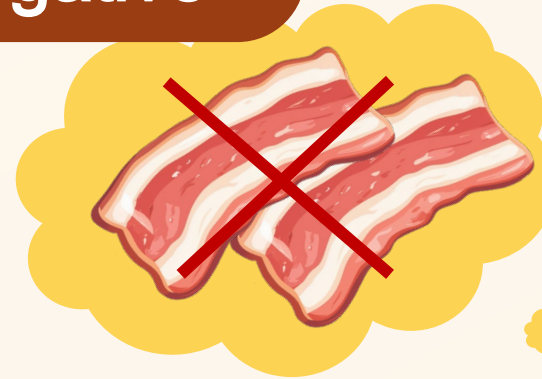


I want **some** bacon.

More examples

I have some money. (positive)

negative



I don't want **any** bacon.

More examples

I don't have any money. (negative)

Present the Grammar

some vs. any

We use **some** only in two types of questions:

- 1 Questions you ask to offer help
e.g. Do you want **some** sausages?
- 2 Questions to ask for things
e.g. Can I have **some** yogurt?
May I take **some** photos here?

We use **any** in all questions except the two types of questions on the left.

- e.g. Is there **any** yogurt in the refrigerator?
- Do you have **any** story books?
- Are there **any** questions?
