## $\cancel{3}$ The Sounds of English

i) Pronunciation of individual English words involves a lot of '<u>schwa sounds</u>' (the name of the neutral vowel sound represented by the IPA symbol /ə/. E.g. corporate /kɔ:pərət/

ii) When we say a sentence in English, we join or "link" words to each other. Because of this linking, the words in a sentence do not always sound the same as when we say them individually. <u>Linking</u> is very important in English. If you recognize and use linking, two things will happen:

you will understand other people more easily
 other people will understand you more easily

iii) There are some <u>sounds that disappear</u> in a sentence.

Consonant sounds at the end of words disappear if the same consonant sounds follow.
Such consonant sounds as /p/ /b/ /t/ /d/ /k/ /g/ at the end of words disappear if followed by consonant.
